



## **curated by\_vienna 2013: Why Painting Now?**

*International curator project in 20 Viennese galleries*

**curated by\_vienna** aims at intensifying cooperation between leading Viennese contemporary art galleries and international curators. In its fifth year curated by\_vienna, which has been initiated by departure—the Creative Agency of the City of Vienna in cooperation with selected Viennese galleries, focuses on issues that are dedicated to painting.

**Why Painting Now?** is the title of this year's edition of curated by\_vienna for which curator Eva Maria Stadler has developed the concept on behalf of departure. Together with the participating galleries and curators she has further pursued the diverse questions currently arising in the field of painting. Visitors to the exhibition will get an insight into both the enormous variety of issues connected with painting and different curatorial approaches. curated by\_vienna opens on October 10, 2013 during the VIENNAFAIR and will be on view from October 11 through November 14 in 20 Viennese galleries.

According to departure's managing director Bettina Leidl, the project boosts Vienna's international standing as a city of the arts: *"In the past years curated by\_vienna has established as a successful network and communication project that attracts huge international attention. We have launched this project to strengthen cooperation between international curators and Viennese galleries, focusing on topics in tune with the times. With this year's focus on painting curated by\_vienna triggers discussions that stir up debate in the art scenes of other metropolises as well."*

## **WHY PAINTING NOW?**

While artists were searching for new ways of expression in painting when the first tendencies towards abstraction emerged in the early 20th century, only half a century later the question was raised whether this medium was still of relevance at all today, or whether it was rather being

replaced by photography, film and later on by performance. Interestingly enough, the “end of painting” has always been proclaimed when a distinctive technical innovation was about to establish itself. What is truly puzzling, however, is the fact that painting is experiencing a constant revival that takes place in parallel to the digital revolution: precise forms and intuition, conceptual and mimetic, abstract and figurative approaches amalgamate in contemporary painting. Today painting can be understood as a web of different approaches which may well overlap. The title **Why Painting Now?** is thus to be understood as a rhetorical question—a question rather provoking further questions than offering simple answers (*curatorial concept by Eva Maria Stadler at [www.curatedby.at](http://www.curatedby.at)*).

## **20 INTERNATIONAL CURATORS**

Curators from 15 different European and international cultural locations will be participating in curated by\_vienna 2013. Some of them occupy leading positions in renowned institutions, while others through their work as freelance curators strongly influence the art scenes of the places they live and work in. Among the participating curators are both renowned theorists and personalities who predominantly work as artists themselves (*detailed biographies of the curators are available at [www.curatedby.at](http://www.curatedby.at)*).

According to the guiding theme **Why Painting Now?** the curators have developed different approaches that show that the art form of painting is constantly redefining itself by permanently verifying and enlarging its opportunities. Hence, **Why Painting Now?** does not stand for the simple contemplation of panel paintings but for a wider concept of painting that interacts with other media including installations, photography, video and performance thus demonstrating that painting has long become part of a pictorial world beyond the mere painted canvas—also in terms of its material qualities.

## **20 EXHIBITIONS IN 20 VIENNESE GALLERIES**

**Why Painting Now?** offers group exhibitions and solo shows which will provide the visitors with the opportunity to come across established artistic perspectives and others yet to be discovered. The different exhibitions react to painting-specific questions, to the relation between tone and painterly gesture, picture surface and space, illusion and reality, concept and author. The projects furthermore examine how painting manifests itself as a social process equally involving artists, viewers, institutions and media (*information on the individual exhibitions and curators is available at [www.curatedby.at](http://www.curatedby.at)*).

### **CURATED BY\_ VIENNA 2013 @ VIENNFAIR 2013**

Eva Maria Stadler has developed an exhibition concept for departure's booth (H14) at the VIENNFAIR that incorporates aspects of this year's title **Why Painting Now?** Based on an installation devised by the artist Johannes Porsch for departure's presentation at the VIENNFAIR 2012, there will be superimposed wall panels painted in shimmering pink varnish. The installation displays a constellation of artistic works dealing with the relation between painting, body, desire, economy and digitality. With works by Monika Baer, John Miller, Oswald Oberhuber, Amy Sillman, Heimo Zobernig und Astrid Wagner.

**curated by\_vienna 2013** is funded by departure and organized in cooperation with the 20 participating galleries. departure, the Creative Agency of the City of Vienna and subsidiary company of the Vienna Business Agency, was established in 2003 as Austria's first independent business promotion agency and service center for companies of the creative industries. departure supports and networks Viennese companies of the creative industries in the fields of architecture, audio-vision, design, art market, media/publishing, fashion, multimedia and music. Since the launch of the funding program 402 companies received funding in the amount of some 25.4 million euros, and more than 1,800 highly qualified jobs were created or secured.
